JOIN THE FOOD SAVERS

Did you know that 14 billion pounds of food are thrown away every year in the United States? Much of this is food that has been prepared - but not eaten - in restaurants, food stores, cafeterias, and hotels. A new national law is making it easier for these places to donate their surplus of food to day care centers, food programs for the elderly or very young, and homeless or battered women's shelters. The Federal Good Samaritan Law, signed last fall by President Clinton, says that volunteers and organizations that donate food cannot be sued if any problems (such as bacteria) arise with food that has been donated in good faith. The law has resulted in a big increase in food donations. You can help, too. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has a new publication called "A Citizen's Guide to Food Recovery" that tells what individuals can do to help donate food to the needy.
